FROM THE RECTOR:

Holy Week and Easter Sunday may seem far away now, but I want to take a moment to thank everyone who had a hand in making it wonderful. Our church is relatively small by some standards but there is no less work that goes into these celebrations than in much larger congregations. During Holy Week, the Altar Guild has something to do almost every day and certainly for each of the services. Shirley Ellis and her crew worked diligently to have everything just right. Paula, Amy and the choir and musicians added so much to our worship experience. Our readers, acolytes and ushers also play a role in each service and we are grateful to them. Cassandra Watkins prepared a wonderful refreshment table after the 11 am service on Easter Sunday morning. I want to thank Father Stults and Deacon Williams for assisting me in these wonderful services. And my thanks to you as well for attending these beautiful remembrances of Our Lord's passion, death and resurrection. I don't know exactly how many of you attended each service (I suspect we have a count), but attendance was good and after being concerned about the weather on Easter, more people came to St. Francis on Easter Sunday than ever before. I know that I have left someone out that should be thanked. I always do. But no one does this for the thanks. You do it for the love of God and our parish. So, thanks to each and every one of you.

May 21 is Ascension Day. We will have a Holy Communion service at 12 noon. Ascension is one of those Holy Days that is often forgotten since it falls in the middle of the week and it is easy to wait until Sunday to go to church. Our liturgical calendar refers to it as a day of obligation. Unlike Roman Catholics who observe six Holy Days of Obligation during the church year, Anglicans are less likely to think in terms of an obligation to attend a service on a particular day regardless of the feast, even Sunday. However, even our Book of Common Prayer references our obligations as a member of the church. In the Offices of Instruction on page 291 the question is asked "What is your bounden duty as a member of the Church?" The answer is, "My bounden duty is to follow Christ, to worship God every Sunday in his Church; and to work and pray and give for the spread of the kingdom." The prayer book sees our Sunday worship as an obligation. I would hope that we might see it as a privilege and a joy as well. The past several years we have had this celebration in the evening with less than outstanding attendance. I will try it at noon this year to see if it is more convenient for more members

Sally Looke and I were talking recently, and I was telling her about some of the resources that are available online for Anglicans. It's not unusual to fall into the thinking that besides the <u>BCP</u>, and perhaps the Anglican Missal (which I have one but can't find even though I promised Fr. Len I would so he could peruse it), we have few other books that are designed to aid us in our sanctification in an Anglican manner. Sally, in her usual wise manner, suggested I bring this information to the rest of you. Thank you, Sally.

I'd Googled "the hours of prayer" since it was part of my Lenten observance to pray the hours (Lauds, Prime, Terce, Sext, None, Vespers, and Compline) daily with as much regularity as possible. I have this 'somewhere' (also known as the black hole of my library both in the house and in the shed in boxes) but of course, couldn't lay hands on it. It's still 'somewhere,' probably nestled alongside The Anglican Missal. The upshot of this is a delightful discovery known as <u>www.CommonPrayer.org</u>. You can find there at least two very helpful entries, <u>The order for the Hourly Offices (compiled from</u> Anglican Sources) and <u>A Collection of Private</u> <u>Devotions for the Hours of Prayer</u>, compiled by John Cosin, D.D., Bishop of Durham. These are now part of the public domain and may be reprinted. Cousin's <u>Collection</u> is a great book in many ways and I leave it to you to utilize it. It tells the "why" as well as the "how."

There are other books on the sight and I've printed these two and another for priests and made a manual for my use and benefit. I'm continuing my new practice of keeping the hours; by the way...our Lenten disciplines are not to be shelved once Lent is over. I find that stopping what I'm doing every three hours (when practical and without Pharisaical rigidity) really does allow me spiritual and mental refreshment the like of which I'd not experienced before. While I've followed fairly well the priestly directive of praying Morning and Evening prayer daily and maintaining a regular Quiet Time of Bible reading, study, and prayer; this is not a burden added but a pleasure enjoyed. For the technicallyminded, Morning and Evening Prayer were created by the boiling down of the Hours of Prayer.

My other devotional readings have led me to accept the precept that the greatest sin of the modern Church is prayerlessness. How can one love, know, and thereby obey God when no time is spent in prayer to and with Him? The "saying of the hours" is a propitious methodology for doing what we should, but perhaps haven't, due to lack of a program.
