TEACHING KIDS ABOUT THE SANCTITY OF LIFE

I believe every child – regardless of circumstances – has equal and irrevocable worth. There's no such thing as unwanted. Shifting the culture from believing this is going to take radical and intentional steps from parents and communities about how we teach children about the value of life, from a very young age.

When I say, "sanctity of life", you may automatically think about a political point of view. I want to note something before we move forward: While that way of thinking may be true for some people, I believe that sanctity of life is so much more than that.

We see how God values life all over the Bible. In every book, we're reading about altruism, education, activism, and radical hospitality. Those things are transferable beyond a political or religious viewpoint. In fact, raising children who value life can be independent from any particular faith orientation, allowing our children to impact the church community & wider culture.

Teach your children about the sanctity of their lives. By doing that, by talking openly about the identity that God has given them, it's only natural that this will shape their view of others.

So...

What can you do?

Here is a small list of ways to practically teach, through intentionality and action, the values of pro-life to our children:

- When reading the Bible, focus on the person of Jesus. He came to us and for us, and He is with us today. Why? Because God has placed irrevocable value on our lives, value that cannot be taken away. Through the stories in the Bible, we see God's rescue plan unfold- a plan to reconcile us to the Father through the precious blood of Jesus.
- Read scripture verses with your children about the value God places on human life.
- Talk to kids about pregnancy! Almost every family has a friend who is expecting a baby or has

a baby in their home. Explain how pregnancy works, how babies develop, etc. Speak about these things in such a way that kids come to learn about their holiness and sacredness.

- If you know someone who is facing an unexpected pregnancy, invite them into your home and offer your time, attention, wisdom, kindness, acceptance, and love.
- Adopt a child (if you can and you feel like that is what God is calling you to!).
- As a family, spend time with families who have adopted or fostered children and get to know the heart behind why they do it.
- Babysit for families who have adopted/foster children to give the parents a date night.
- Make meals for families who have adopted/foster – make and deliver meals with your children and include them!
- Babysit for a family who has a child with disabilities.
- Become a host home for <u>Safe Families for</u> <u>Children.</u>
- Provide a safe place or safe space to your child's friends who might have a difficult and challenging home life. Mentorship can move mountains!
- Open your home to your children's friends or teammates. Be involved in the lives of your children and get to know their friends.

Teaching our children to be genuinely pro-life requires intentional and often-times, inconvenient actions. As with all things, it is imperative to look at the example Jesus gave us while here on Earth. I mean, talk about someone who was pro-life. Christ served others relentlessly, and ultimately, He willingly surrendered his life so we could have eternal life. He gave up Heaven's comforts to sacrifice everything for us – those formed in His image.

ADULT CATECHISM CLASS

Did you ever wonder what is discussed in the weekly adult catechism class? The best way to find out is to join it and see for yourself. The catechism we use is organized so as to permit the material to be read and understood in small pieces. The class, which is held on Wednesdays at 7 p.m., nearly always ends promptly at 7:30, because a suitable stopping point is always in view. You can join the class at any time, and you are not required to commit to any number of sessions.

Catechesis -- the formal teaching of a document called a catechism (which is a presentation of basic and important Christian principles) -- is a time-honored practice in the Church, and has been an important part of the Anglican Way since the beginning; the 1549 edition of the Book of Common Prayer contains a catechism nearly identical to the one found on pages 577-582 of our 1928 BCP. This brief document has been used for centuries in the instruction of children who had been baptized as infants and needed preparation for Confirmation. However, the adult catechism class is using a much more detailed, booklength catechism intended for use by all who seek a deeper knowledge of the Christian faith. It is an excellent resource for adults who count themselves believers and who recognize the need to improve their own understanding of the Faith once delivered.

The book *To be a Christian: An Anglican Catechism* is organized into four sections:

- Beginning with Christ
- Believing in Christ
- Belonging to Christ
- Becoming like Christ

Within the four sections are a series of short questions with slightly longer answers with citing Bible verses that support both. We discuss the question and the answer and move quickly through the Bible verses. As of the writing of this article, the group is in the third section "Belonging to Christ", working through questions on the Lord's Prayer. The text to questions is shared on the screen for all to view, along with the Bible verses in another document.

Here are samples of what we discuss:

162. Why should you practice the Lord's Prayer?

I should pray the Lord's Prayer regularly because it teaches me to pray as Jesus commanded and to desire what his Father wills. (*Psalm 34; Matthew 12:46–50; 26:36–44; 1 John 5:14–15*).

163. How is the Lord's Prayer a pattern for prayer?

The Lord's Prayer models the primary types of prayer: praise of God, intercession for his rule, petition for his provision and protection, and confession of sins. I should pray regularly in all these ways. (*Psalm 150; Isaiah 63:7–64:12; Acts 9:36–43; 3 John 2*)

164. What are the parts of the Lord's Prayer?

The traditional form of the Lord's Prayer begins by addressing God the Father, makes seven petitions, adds a doxology, and concludes with "Amen."

The next few months will be discussion on the Lord's Prayer. In the end, this results in a mini-Lord's Prayer course, but at a pace of 30 minutes, once a week.

Please consider joining us! We have about 9-10 people who regularly join in and want to spread the word that the half hour spent in discussion is well worth the effort. We all find value in this class and want to encourage others to join us.

An email is sent out each Wednesday morning with the link to the Zoom meeting.
